

Autocourse - 60 years of World Championship Grand Prix motor racing

This unique publication tells the story of the global Formula One World Championship from its roots, before World War II, to the present day.

It covers the sport from 1894 to its adoption by the Germans as a propaganda tool before the war. After the conflict, Alfa Romeo dominated, before being dethroned by Maserati and Ferrari in the Fifties.

Then came the might of Mercedes-Benz. With the arrival of the 2,5-litre formula in 1954 came the emergence of the British challengers in the form of Vanwall, Cooper and Lotus. At the same time, the 1,5-litre formula saw small British teams lead the world in the development of chassis technology.

The advent of the Cosworth DFV engine and sponsorship in the Sixties changed the face of the championship, encouraging a new level of competition led by teams such as March, Tyrrell, Brabham and McLaren.

Ferrari fought back in the late Seventies.

The Eighties were characterised by the turbocharger, while the Nineties saw the rise of new names such as Benetton, Jordan, Stewart and British American Racing. Finally, the past decade has seen the major car manufacturers play a greater role in the sport.
